Collection Description

Biographical and Historical Note

The Christian Methodist Episcopal Church was formed out of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, which had separated in 1844 from the Methodist Episcopal Church in America, primarily over the issue of slavery. During the antebellum and Civil War periods, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, included a large number of slaves, who were cared for by slave preachers. In the

wake of the Civil War and the emancipation of the slaves, the newly freed slaves under the leadership of their former slave preachers separated from the Methodist Episcopal Church, South (ME Church, South), and established the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church (the CME Church), which was later renamed the Christian Methodist Episcopal Church.

The CME viewed education as an important element in its mission. The church established several educational institutions, the most important of which were Paine College, in Augusta, Georgia, and Lane College, in Jackson, Tennessee. Paine College was established in 1882 with the cooperation and support of the ME, South. The trustees came from both churches, and the first president was the Reverend Morgan Callaway, a white presiding clergyman of the ME, South. The presidency of the college was held by a white until 1971 when Lucius Henry Pitt became the first African American CME president of Paine College. The ME, South, Church provided scholarships for CME young men to attend the college, and after the ME, South, merged into the United Methodist Church in the twentieth century, the United Methodists continued this support.
